MATHS Week - To start of our term, we have been looking at some marvellous maths. Our focus has been geometry and fractions - this has led to lots of creative work. The inspiration came from two 1950 videos by Rene Jodoin: Notes on a triangle and Dance Squared. The images from the videos sparked lots of discussion.

We even looked at the record breaking attempt at folding paper in half! The children enjoyed spotting the pattern of the fractions. Marshall Mundy in year 4, and Crystal Sunil and Sophie Griffin in Year 6 explored this straight after assembly and found a




AUTHORS OF THE TERM



Phase I - Shirley Hughes is an English author and illustrator. She has written more than fifty books, which have sold more than II.5 million copies, and has illustrated more than two hundred. She won the 1977 and 2003 Kate Greenaway Medals for British children's book illustration and her 1977 winner, Dogger, was named in 2007 the public favourite winning work of the first fifty years. She won the inaugural Booktrust lifetime achievement award in 2015. She is a patron of the Association of Illustrators.



Phase 2 - Jill Murphy is an English writer and illustrator of children's books, best known for the Worst Witch novels and the "Large Family" picture books. She has been called "one of the most engaging writers and illustrators for children in the land. First published in 1986, Five Minutes Peace has sold more than five million copies worldwide and been translated into 19 languages. For the second book, All in One Piece (1987), she was a commended runner-up for the Greenaway Medal from the British Library Association, recognising the year's best children's book by a British subject (the second of her two commendations). The "Large Family" is now a TV series on CBeebies.



Phase 3 - Michael Morpurgo was born in 1943 in St Albans, Hertfordshire. He worked as a teacher for ten years before leaving to set up 'Farms for City Children' with his wife Clare. (They were both awarded the MBE for services to youth in 1999.) They have three farms in Devon, Wales and Gloucestershire, which are open to inner city school children. Michael Morpurgo is the author of many books for children, including The Wreck of the Zanzibar, which won the Whitbread Children's Book Award (1995); The Butterfly Lion, which won the Nestlé Smarties Book Prize (Gold Award, 1996); Kensuke's Kingdom, which won the Children's Book Award (2000) and Private

Peaceful, which was shortlisted for the Whitbread Children's Book Award (2004) and the Carnegie Medal (2004).

NEW LESSONS FOR EVERYONE AT FAIR FURLONG

At the moment there is a lot of concern about cases of abuse emerging from different sports clubs and particularly football. We have also had a couple of local cases of actual or attempted sexual abuse / grooming on the estate. Therefore we have been asked what else we can do to make sure our children are well equipped to protect themselves and how we can support parents and families with discussing these issues appropriately. We will be using the PANTS material during the last week of term.

We will be holding two coffee morning sessions to give you the apportunity to view the materials we are going to be using with the children. These will be held on Tuesday 10th at 3:30pm and Friday 13th at 9:00am. If you would like to attend one of these sessions then please go to the school office at the appropriate time.

What is PANTS?



PANTS is designed by NSPCC to give children the confidence and understanding that their privates are private. From P through to S, each letter of PANTS provides a simple but valuable lesson that can help keep a child safe: that their body belongs to them, they have a right to say no, and that they should tell an adult they trust if they're warried or upset.

Simple conversations - like crossing the road safely, bullying and dealing with strangers - are subjects that you and your child might talk about. But what about staying safe from sexual abuse? It's a conversation no parent wants to have but thankfully, with the help of the NSPCC PANTS friendly dinosaur Pantosaurus, it doesn't have to be scary. By talking PANTS you have a simple way to help keep your child safe from sexual abuse - without ever using scary words or even mentioning sex.

The PANTS friendly dinosaur mascot Pantosaurus is a great way to get the conversation started. Your children will love his catchy song which acts as a fun introduction to the key messages of PANTS and shows how Pantosaurus uses the rules to stay safe. There's also a quiz which you can do with your child. You can find them both at www.nspcc.org.uk/pants

We will be discussing the NSPCC's Underwear Rule in our Term 3 PSHE lessons. The lessons designed to teach pupils how to stay safe from sexual abuse, without giving explicit information or telling scary stories or even using the term "sexual abuse."

In the lesson, children will learn about the 'PANTS' acrostic, which stands for:

- Privates are private
- Always remember your body belongs to you
- No means no
- Talk about secrets that upset you
- · Speak up, someone can help

The lesson will be delivered in a way that's fully age-appropriate. More information about the Underwear Rule, including a short film and a parent.
