On Tuesday 7th November we were very fortunate to be visited by Rosamunde Birch from the House of Parliament Education Service. Rosamunde ran two workshops with groups of our Year 5/6 children including our school councillors. This presented us with another great opportunity to learn more about how our **democracy** works. Rosamunde, in fact, explained that democracy actually means "power to the people".

> <u>Debating Workshop -</u> The first workshop Rosamunde ran with us was a **debating workshop**. The room was set up as if we were actually in the House of Commons. The government and the opposition (shadow cabinet) sat on opposite sides of a table. **Heaven-Leah Young** was elected as speaker of the House of Commons by

her classmates. We learnt that the speaker needs to remain impartial. They can't take sides. It was Heaven-Leah's job to maintain order and ensure

everyone was having their say during our debates. We learnt that if you want to speak in the House of Commons you need to stand up and wait for the speaker to give you permission. It is customary to say "thank you madam speaker" when she has given you permission to speak. We practiced saying this. When someone is speaking in the House of Commons the rules are that you listen and you don't interrupt.



The first subject we debated was **should school assemblies be delivered as a rap or a song twice a week?** We voted against this idea. The second debate was **should young people be allowed to choose their favourite subjects to learn at school?**

We were then presented with an imaginary Bill to debate. The Bill said "There should be no homework for children in primary schools". We were given time to come up with our opposing arguments. We were reminded that we were making a decision for all the children in the UK, not just a decision for ourselves. People had some passionate views and there were a



few points when Madame Speaker had to call for order! In the end we voted overwhelmingly against abolishing homework. Twenty three children walked down the 'no' corridor to cast their vote and just seven walked down the 'aye' corridor.







Feedback from the children following the workshop was very positive. Faith Jackson in Year 5 commented "The workshop was inspiring. I learnt a lot." <u>Campaign for Change Workshop -</u> In this workshop we learnt about some famous campaigners from history; Martin Luther King, Nelson Mandella, Rosa Parks and Gandhi.

We learnt about different methods of **campaigning**: lobbying your MP, petitioning, using social media, taking direct action, protesting, education and boycotting. In groups we were asked to discuss what method we think is most effective. Every group had different opinions. We learnt that campaigning can bring about positive change. An example of this was the **Suffragette** movement. It's hard to believe now that women were only given equal voting rights to men in 1928.

Feedback from the children was also very positive. Riley Corfe in Year 5 commented "It was really interesting to learn about campaigners from the past. I enjoyed learning about Rosa Parks. She changed the world for the better because of what she did."



Rosamunde Birch then joined the whole school for assembly where the children had the opportunity to ask her lots of questions. We all learnt a lot from Rosamunde's visit and feel very grateful we have had this opportunity.



As the nights are drawing in and it is getting darker a lot earlier please remind your children about 'Stranger Danger'. Children should always be aware of the importance of letting their parents/carers know where they are at all times.

Y6 to Caldicot - On Wednesday Year 6 visited Caldicot Castle. The journey to the castle took approximately one hour. When we arrived we were met by a Knight who showed us all the different types of armour and weapons used. He then went on to talk about all the different jobs a Knight is responsible for. After lunch, we walked around the castle and explored the castle grounds. We



travelled up steep staircases and imagined defending the castle from tall towers. We really enjoyed our day!



BASIL CLASS ASSEMBLY - Basil class did a fantastic job in their class assembly today. They told us all about how basil is part of the mint

family and can be found all over the world in places such as Thailand, China and Taiwan. From this, we discovered some of the dishes that basil can be used in, these included Margarita pizzas, Chinese stir fries and even ice cream! As well as being used as an ingredient in food we found out that it has many other uses too. Basil can be used to create a wide range of scents such as lemon, clove and liquorice. Finally it is used in aiding medicines as it includes properties that can help with headaches, fevers and scaring away mosquitos. Well done Basil Class!
